In 2019, 792,000 people age 60 or older lived in metro Atlanta—
that's 1 in 8 of us.

By 2030, our older-adult population is expected to grow to **1.2 million**,
or about 1 in 4 of the region's residents.

Most of us want to stay in our communities as we age, but we need easy access to transportation, pedestrian-friendly neighborhoods, and housing that is affordable and accessible for every stage of life.

This is where our work comes in.

SPOTLIGHT ON Serving Older Adults During COVID-19

Funds spent April-November 2020

ARC's Aging & Independence Services Group helped partner organizations adapt their funding to respond to older adults' critical needs. **ARC allocated \$5.4 million regionwide** in federal Families First and CARES Act dollars, as well as philanthropic funding — **providing a range of services, from caregiving, to wellness support, to nutrition services, to material aid**— assistive equipment such as easy-to-use can openers, as well as short-term help with bills and groceries to help people live more independent lives in their own homes. The agency was also able to help partner organizations provide **weeks of home-delivered meals** to those on a high-priority waitlist for this service. In all, funding through ARC was able to deliver **117,954 emergency home-delivered meals** to **2,637 individuals** throughout the region.

Staying Healthy and Housed

ARC expanded its innovative behavioral health coaching program for older adults at risk of eviction. Thanks to new grant funding, the program was able to add staff and clinical support. The funding also enabled a second service location to launch in Augusta through the Central Savannah River Area Agency on Aging.

What's Next?

ARC experienced an uptick in those accessing services during the COVID-19 pandemic — the agency has been able to respond to that need as we've moved into the next fiscal year, with \$8.3 million in federal funds granted to metro Atlanta for direct COVID-relief services for older residents, including congregate and home-delivered meals, in-home support services, transportation, and case management.

But the pandemic also laid bare critical systemic health and social disparities. As the designated Area Agency on Aging under the federal Older Americans Act for the 10-county Atlanta region, ARC's Aging & Independence Services Group advocates for these services at the federal, state, and local levels.

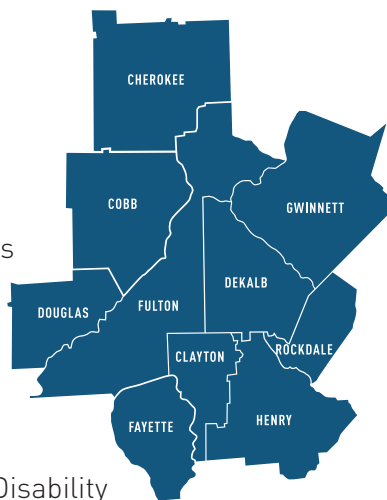
