
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ATLDOT Background

- Formed in 2020 as a result of years of disjointed transportation planning, priorities and project delivery
- OASTP established transportation priorities, goals and specific multi-year actions
- Adopted Vision Zero as official roadway safety program, which included 25 mph default speed limits and adopted NACTO's Urban Street Design Guides



Traffic death rates in Atlanta for both drivers and pedestrians are three times higher than in peer cities like Seattle, Minneapolis and Boston





In 2019 alone, 73 people died on Atlanta's streets including 22 pedestrians, 3 scooter riders and a cyclist




Atlanta's annual traffic deaths have increased by 85% since 2017

72% of Atlanta's traffic deaths and 42% of traffic injuries occur on only 6% of the city's streets. We call this Atlanta's High-Injury Network.




