

IIJA Background

- August 10, 2021 19 Republicans and 50 Democrats in the U.S. Senate overwhelmingly pass the \$1.2 trillion Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)
- November 5, 2021 13 Republicans and 215
 Democrats in the U.S. House of Representatives pass the IIJA without amendment
- November 15, 2021 President Biden signs the IIJA into law PL 117-58

IIJA in a Nutshell



• Significant <u>increases in funding for existing transportation programs</u> (surface transportation block grants; transit formula programs, etc.)



 Large <u>new programs</u> covering a broad range of areas, such as climate change, equity and complete streets programs. Some are formula programs, but many are competitive discretionary programs. Proactive and thoughtful planning will be required to access and maximize the potential of these funds.



- Familiarize yourself with the new programs to understand if there may be a match for a critical need. ARC can help with questions.
