The Cumberland CID has been working on implementing creative placemaking efforts throughout the District, most notably laid out in our recent Bike Master Plan along with our recent I-75 Gateway Enhancement project. Our goal with this LCI study is to create a strategic plan that identifies opportunities for placemaking initiatives that will promote pedestrian safety and local art. As a car-centric community, the CCID is working to improve our alternative modes of transportation thereby becoming a more pedestrian and bicycle-friendly community. One way to achieve this is by improving pedestrian safety by installing safety features and educating the public. The goal of this study will include detailing ways we can establish specific connections between our public, private stakeholders, and local arts organizations. We plan to activate previously underutilized public and private open spaces where we can so that we might bring members of the community together by promoting the arts through engaging activities. Interactions like these allow communities to establish more of a sense of place so that people can take pride in where they live or simply spend their free time. Workshops, open markets, and fundraisers are examples of the types of events that can provide opportunities to make deeper connections with community members. We will be overmatching with our \$100,000 commitment.

HOW DOES THIS PROPOSED LCI STUDY ADDRESS A NEED IN YOUR COMMUNITY?

The Cumberland area is bisected by 2 major interstates, I-75 and I-285, and a 10-lane U.S. highway in Cobb Parkway. We host over 80,000 jobs which means tens of thousands of vehicles on the roads daily. As we continue to tackle the issue of connectivity, we are also looking for ways to implement pedestrian safety features on the roads. Perilous road conditions negatively affect accessibility which in turn creates more hurdles for communities to surpass to come together. Our community needs opportunities to bring the public together by utilizing the arts community. We plan to explore and learn of various creative placemaking concepts that we can develop alongside the community and install for everyone's benefit. Ideas like landscape barriers for multi-use paths, decorative sidewalks, and public art installations are just some of the ways to achieve these goals. Pursuing the implementation of creative placemaking provide us with the opportunity to utilize Cumberland's arts community as an attraction for the public's attentions. Cumberland already has a deep connection with arts organizations in the Cobb Arts Vibe, Arts Bridge Foundation, and the Cobb Performing Arts Center. Local artists should be thrust into the forefront of our community planning if we are going to consider more creative methods of unifying the CID.

The Cumberland CID plans to approach this issue from all sides. We understand that to reach our goals of a connecting the community through art, we will have to engage various stakeholders and community members. Our study will begin by identifying the different physical attributes and community events we can invest in to help us create a sense of place. We will then be able to focus our approach by engaging with the community directly. This will be a very important part of the process so that the public knows that they play an integral role in shaping their community for the future. For example, community-based workshops are great ways to bring together artists and community stakeholders so that they have a chance to sit down and create goals and objectives of their own that can be implemented. We see the arts community being crucial in this process by providing not only the artwork but also the artistic point of view that is necessary for this type of community planning. Showcasing the arts in tandem will be ultimate goal of this study. Local artists have the ability to bring the collective ideas of the public to life which will aid us along the way to achieving the high community buy-in for this program.

Accessibility is paramount to the growth of the Cumberland community, and we pride ourselves on providing equal mobility options to users of all ages and abilities. As an automobile dependent community, individuals without access to cars can be at a large disadvantage when it comes to commuting around the district. Historically, commuting without a car has been the least convenient option for transportation. In 2016, the Cumberland CID completed a Bike Master Plan which included methods to improve the access to mobility options and overall connectivity of the area. This means providing more ADA accessible sidewalks to pedestrians with disabilities and opportunities to use alternative modes of transportations throughout the district. We plan to provide methods for these pedestrians to provide input on what they may deem important when it comes to daily transportation. Events and workshops centered around multimodal travel will help to bridge the gap between our current state of transportation and where we need to be to provide access for the community. By bringing these issues to the forefront, we hope to not only educate but also promote this marginalized group so that they too can enjoy the wonderful amenities that Cumberland has to offer.

Cobb County Government Complete Streets Policy - January 2009

Purpose:

To assure that new roadway construction and existing roadway improvement projects on County roadways include consideration for adequate infrastructure, where appropriate and feasible, for bicyclists, pedestrians, users of public transit of all ages and abilities, and the physically disabled.

Applicability: Applies to all roadways within the County.

Rationale: Some of Cobb County's existing roadways where bicycling and walking are prevalent

> lack the infrastructure needed to make these means of travel safe. These roadways may lack sidewalks and/or crosswalks, have lanes that are too narrow to share with bicyclists, and make insufficient accommodation for transit users or the physically disabled. There is a need to improve accommodations for a growing segment of the County's population

that travels by means other than the automobile.

Background: This policy supports the Department's Mission Statement, which is to plan, design,

construct, operate and maintain a multi-modal transportation network in a fiscally responsible manner to promote safe and efficient travel throughout Cobb County.

The County's Comprehensive Transportation Plan calls for the incorporation of Complete Streets into the planning, design and construction of all future roadways when adequate right-of-way is available.

The Cobb County Senior Adult Transportation Study (SATS) recommends the use of Complete Streets principles in the planning and design of transportation infrastructure. Complete Streets principles also play a large role in Tier 2 of the 3-step implementation program for the SATS.

The Atlanta Regional Commission's Atlanta Region Bicycle Transportation and Pedestrian Walkways Plan was developed to address the infrastructure and policy needs for the 13-county ARC planning area, which includes Cobb County. Amongst the plan's policy recommendations is the following: *Incorporate the concepts of routine* accommodation and Complete Streets into planning, design, and construction of all future roadways and adopt development review regulations requiring developers to build bicycle and pedestrian facilities as integral components of their transportation infrastructure.

Complete Streets policies and design practices played a large role in the revision of the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials' (AASHTO) Guide for the Development of Bicycle Facilities. In keeping with the long-standing practice of adhering to AASHTO standards and guidelines, the Department sees fit for it to establish this policy formally.

Policy: Cobb County will implement the Complete Streets concept by considering safe access for

all users, to include motorists, bicyclists, pedestrians and transit users, including individuals with physical disabilities and senior citizens, in the planning, design,

construction and operation of streets within its jurisdiction.

5.10 Wayfinding and Trail Markings on Walls

Concrete walls of varying heights and lengths exist throughout the CID. Many of these walls are along existing and proposed multipurpose trails. These walls present the CID with an opportunity to use them for trail wayfinding and markings. The following images show conceptual ideas of how these walls could be sandblasted to note trail locations and features.

Local Example Wayfinding and Trail Markings on Walls

The PATH Foundation in coordination with the Buckhead CID, Livable Buckhead, Inc. and the Georgia Department of Transportation completed similar trail markings on walls along the segment of the PATH 400 that runs along Lenox Road. As illustrated in the images, letters were first painted on the wall using large stencils. The letters where then sandblasted at a 1/4" depth to allow for the concrete aggregate to be exposed. The Cumberland CID could follow a similar process to use walls as wayfinding and trail markings.


Figure 5.10g - Local examples along the segment of the PATH 400 (Cont'd)



Cumberland CIDBoundary Map Cumberland Community IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT


