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ARC's Mission

Foster thriving communities for all within the Atlanta region through collaborative, data-informed planning and investments.



Goal

Strategic investments in people, infrastructure, mobility, and preserving natural resources.

Improving Mobility in Cherokee

\$459 million in federal and state funds allocated by ARC through 2028 to improve transportation across Cherokee County. Key projects include:

- SR 20 Widening SR 20 will become a six-lane road for 2.1 miles from East Cherokee Drive to east of SR 369 that will include raised median and a multi-use path.
- Ball Ground Bypass A two-lane road will connect Ball Ground Road near Flatbottom Road to I-575.
- Noonday Creek Trail Extension The trail will be extended by 1.8 miles between SR 92 and Noonday Creek Park, providing a critical link to the Cobb County trail system for bicyclists and pedestrians.

1.2 million fewer miles traveled by the **196 Cherokee residents** who participated in the Georgia Commute Options program, saving them \$729,582 in fuel and vehicle maintenance costs.



Securing a Sustainable Future

The Metropolitan North Georgia Water District, which is managed by ARC, adopted an update to the Water Resources Management Plan that improves the Atlanta region's resilience to droughts by enhancing conservation education efforts and enabling the region's water providers to enforce stateissued drought restrictions. An effective early response could mitigate the need for more stringent watering restrictions during a severe drought.

Making Cherokee an Even Better Place to Live, Work, and Play

\$176,000 Livable Centers Initiative Grant

to the **City of Woodstock** for the **Highway 92 Development Standards Study**, which seeks to create a new set of development standards along Highway 92. The goal is to pave the way for future economic growth through intuitive, user-friendly standards, intentional architectural design, incorporation of affordable/diverse housing options, and improved walkability.

Bells Ferry Road Trail

ARC has allocated funding to Cherokee County to build Bells Ferry Road Trail, a 3.5-mile multi-use path along Bells Ferry Road from the Cobb County line to Victory Drive. The path, funded through ARC's LCI program, provides new transportation and recreation opportunities in the fast-growing South Cherokee area.
