WORLD-CLASS INFRASTRUCTURE

ARC works with its regional partners to develop and maintain world-class infrastructure, including a transportation network that improves mobility and a sustainable supply of clean water.



Improving Mobility in Forsyth

\$300 million in federal and state transportation funds allocated by ARC for projects that include: lane improvements along SR 9 and correcting alignment issues along Jewell Bennett Road.

fewer miles traveled by the 214 Forsyth residents who participated in the Georgia Commute Options program, saving them \$577,496 in fuel and vehicle maintenance costs.







- Loilet rebates received by Forsyth residents, facilitating the replacement of older, inefficient toilets.
- Forsyth County students participated in the Metro Water District's Middle School Essay Contest. The Metro Water District held its 10th Annual Water Drop Dash 5K, attracting over 600 participants.


2020 Census




